

Greetings!





Participating jazz bands are from Freeport Intermediate, Lake Jackson Intermediate, Brazosport High School, Brazoswood High School A.M & P.M., and Brazosport College. All the school groups will perform on a concert at 7 pm on November 18 with members of the T.S. Monk Ensemble joining each group as guest soloists. Then on Friday, November 19 at 7:30 pm, the T.S. Monk Ensemble will perform a concert of their own music.”

Tickets for the Friday evening concert are \$25-adults, \$20-senior citizens 60+, and \$10-students or children 12 and under. Tickets are available online at clarion.brazosport.edu.

T.S. Monk, Jr., son of the jazz legend Thelonious Sphere Monk, has established himself as one of the leading forces in jazz composition, performance, and education. The young Monk joined his father’s trio and toured with his dad until the elder Monk’s retirement in 1975. T. S. then launched into the music that had captivated him and his generation, R&B. He first toured with a group called Natural Essence and afterward, with his sister Barbara, formed his own band with which he had hits on two recordings, *House Of Music* and *More Of The Good Life*, where he played drums, arranged, and sang.

T. S. received the New York Jazz Awards first annual “Recording of the Year” and *Downbeat*’s prestigious 63rd Reader’s Poll Award for *Monk On Monk*, the “80th Anniversary Birthday Tribute to Thelonious Sphere Monk” featuring twenty guest artists including Herbie Hancock, Wayne Shorter, Arturo Sandoval, Dianne Reeves, Nnenna Freelon, and Howard Johnson, among others.

Shortly after his father passed away, Thelonious turned his attention toward forming the Thelonious Monk Institute of Jazz, sponsoring music education for students in the form of full scholarships, funding, and supplies. As chairman, Thelonious has been at the forefront of helping to create a number of programs supporting after-school athletics.

In 1992, Thelonious formed his jazz sextet and received raves from the moment they hit the stage and the studio.

The Stan Kenton Legacy Orchestra leader, Mike Vax, is eager to announce the group is back on the road and ready to come to your school in 2022. Vax reported the following:

Thoughts on Teaching Jazz Part 2: An Open Dialogue

We should call this *jazz season*, because we have much more available time to prepare for 'live' fall or winter jazz concerts or begin jazz meet-and-greets. These can set the tone and momentum for a great spring semester and festival season. If the schedule and possibility exists, it is a time to plant seeds or continue doing so.

An open *dialogue* is an opportunity to plant the seed that we are all in this together. It will show the students you are listening and truly care about their ideas and give your jazz band members a sense of 'ownership'. I welcome my student's input and have developed a rapport that allows input and dialogue. They can often see where they've 'put their stamp' on the program.

We should all want to challenge our students to think and we can really stretch their imagination by asking questions. Sometimes this does create interesting group dynamics along with the challenge of what I would call a 'good problem'. That is, your kids will enjoy having a say and will want more responsibility. Even though there really can be a 'too many chefs in the kitchen' kind of mentality, by asking probing questions and encouraging student's active input we can really create an atmosphere where we see benefits almost immediately. As long as this is balanced, it can create an amazing environment.

A silent jazz class may mean the kids are merely going through the motions while a rowdy class means they aren't being efficient. I explain it as a professional musician might operate: offer help to a neighbor silently when needed, ask questions one at a time, and err on the side of listening. The 'buy-in' can be pretty neat to see.

What are some good ways to get them asking questions and buy in to opening up a dialogue? I find it very effective to ask for volunteers, and if the room is silent, "volun-tell." A buy-in culture of an open dialogue often starts with calling on eager students—the ones that cannot wait to share their idea. I also try to sit down during our dialogue sessions because I want to be eye-level with everyone. Even though I am leading the conversation, it feels less that way to them. When I sit amongst them they are more encouraged to raise their hands and talk about the music.

Another suggestion is to ask probing questions like, "What can we do at Letter I to make it more interesting?", or "Who should we be listening to at Letter I?" I'll sometimes ask if our leads are in a row, who's playing lead, who in the rhythm section should we listen for, what just happened in the piano part's right hand, etc. There are lots of ways to better bring the music to life by using this kind of question-answer dialogue, and the dialogue can go to some incredible places.

I call it a 'light switch'. That's where the students understand it is time to work versus a brain break. I do this by having an established routine and a disciplined environment. Routine and discipline create that feeling of *togetherness*, which means all the individual personalities have come together for the common goal of creating great music together as a band. I tell my students I have one rule: *We are silent during the count-off*. The reason is because that's our opportunity to focus in order to really hone in on starting together and feeling the music together.

Our count-offs are long which creates the opportunity to get in the zone. So, if a student is talking, it defeats the purpose of what we are doing. I then tell them, if I had my way, I'd have a second rule: We are silent during instruction and when others have the floor to speak. By establishing what I want, everyone is on the same page and the priorities are very clear: I want a band who does everything together and is respectful to each other and the music. We want to do this music right.

Lastly, how much time in a rehearsal should we allow for an open dialogue? I think it should happen in every rehearsal and it should feel organic, not rigid, even though it should be structured in your planning. The goal should be a rehearsal so effective that the students walk away from it thinking about the music for hours on end, talking about the music with their friends, and being curious enough to do some listening research on their own or in groups. As their teachers, our responsibility is to know the source recording so well (and others like it, plus the score) that we can effectively describe what we want the players to do. Furthermore, our feedback has to always be specific and direct. It is sometimes really hard to explain what you want with words, so sing or play on your instrument exactly the way you want it done. Have the recordings ready to play as an added reference. Remember to ask probing questions and to ask for volunteers to get the dialogue started. Once your students see this happening, their buy-in can go through the roof and jazz has won them over!

Two Decades Texas Jazz News

In 2001, when Sparky Koerner became president of the IAJE's Texas unit, he made it a goal to resurrect the IAJE newsletter and once again make it a part of the Texas jazz organization. Almost exactly twenty years ago, in December 2001, I edited the first Texas jazz educator's newsletter in the new millennium. A prior newsletter had been published for years, but it had ceased for a brief period.

Noe Marmolejo (University of Houston) was the newsletter editor prior to me and I used his format for my first few editions. The first 'Deep In The Art' newsletters were laid out on paper in 'printer spreads'. 'Printer spread' pages are not in numerical order but arranged to allow them to end up in correct numerical order once the pages are printed. This spread was taken to Sparky Koerner at College of the Mainland, where he had it printed, addressed, folded, and mailed to the membership. Everything was done in black and white. Color copies were not available until we could email the editions to the members which made publishing the newsletter is much easier.

To me, it's fulfilling to realize the amount of teaching and the number of students who were affected by the great efforts of the great music teachers, and by TJEA, over these past twenty years. A lot of that was chronicled in these editions. Though there is still work to be done, I hope all the members are proud of TJEA's achievements to date.

Many of these newsletters are archived on the TJEA website but I thought it might be fun to show two decades of cover pages en masse, so I've displayed them on the following pages in chronological order from left to right, row by row. The images are small but you may be able to zoom in and read, at least somewhat, anything that catches your attention. Enjoy.

It's summer and that means I have a little more time to focus on two of my favorite things - jazz and golf! The older I get, the more I see a parallel between these two activities. Here's what I mean:

- 1) Jazz and golf are lifelong pursuits and all ages are welcome. Youngsters and senior citizens can be found in abundance on the links as well as at jam sessions. (Witness James Ashenold Jazz Camps healthy enrollment of adult hobbyists who are taking a "jazz summer" to play and learn!)
- 2) Jazz and golf are social activities. I find the dialogue between students and accompanists during improvisation to be very similar to the healthy banter (or a bit snarky talk) that occurs between golfing buddies.
- 3) Jazz and golf are open to all ability levels. (You don't have to be John Coltrane or Tiger Woods to play and enjoy yourself!) You can "pick your poison" - starting with the basics 3 course and working your way up to Gary Stupp-Agostini National or you can take the songbook. Golf makes provisions with different tee boxes and handicap adjustments while in jazz you can play slower tempos and/or easier changes.
- 4) Jazz and golf change with the conditions. You can play the same golf course over and over and each round will be completely different based on the weather conditions. Likewise you can play the same standard over and over and it will be completely different depending on the mood, environment, personnel etc. (This is why I love the eternal challenge of jazz and golf!)
- 5) Jazz and golf put me in the presence of beauty. I have played a great golf course as much as I love playing a great standard. It

Also, list any featured student soloist that you might have with the jazz ensemble. The family love to see the name of their son or daughter in the paper or on the web. The more info you can put out prior to and after the concert will help you in developing that audience base that you're looking for. Good luck with publicizing your concert.
