I am beyond excited for the upcoming TMEA Convention that kicks off with our TJEA Symposium on Wednesday February 9th! Our President-elect Matt Hedrick has put

As I write this, the spring semester is officially underway and started with the spectacular Jazz Education Network (JEN) Conference in Dallas. The theme was Renaissance, and it was very appropriate. The sense of community and support was phenomenal. There was electricity in the air.

The first JEN conference performance my students attended was a high school vocal jazz group from Liberty HS in Iowa called "Voltage." The group was completely self-sufficient, with the director taking a backseat the whole show. Student leaders were the speakers, and the kids poured their hearts and souls into the music. We've heard so little live music shows the last two years so emotions ran high. I literally felt the tears hit my cheek thinking of all the work these students put forward, day after day. It truly was a labor of love.

As we get into the day to day realities this spring semester—the grind—we have to continue to strive to keep dreaming....with the goal to turn dreams into

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reality. My goal as an educator is to do what that director from Iowa did for his jazz choir; he helped provide an opportunity for his kids to make their dream come true, and through hard work and determination, created an ensemble that made music that made the audience cry. We have our own dreams and goals as educators, and we can't forget them. It's what drives us, and as long as we think big picture and do what's best for our kids, our success is defined not by what others think but by what we have instilled in our students. My students have defined success with four terms: **Respect** (for the music, for the process, for each other, and themselves); **Mastery** (work to achieve it); **Pull** your own weight (each one has to do it); and finally, it's all about the **Grit**. I keep them in check every so often, reminding them that this is their list, their dreams, and their goals. I ask them if they feel like they are achieving or have achieved them. We aim to keep dreaming as we move forward. But more importantly, we believe in ourselves and each other. My job this spring is to keep pushing for greater heights, prioritizing the emotional aspects of our music and what intangibles we can deliver through live performance.

Waltrip High School Jazz Ensemble All Over Texas!

As the new year began, Houston's Waltrip High School kicked things off with a bang with their Jazz Ensemble #1 being showcased at the Jazz Education Network Conference in Dallas. The band got some clinic time with composer **Kris Berg**, before their preview concert at Sunset High School. Thursday, they swept the stage at JEN with charts by **Alan Baylock, Kris Berg**, and **Maynard Ferguson**. The students had a blast getting to be around world renowned musicians and are thankful for everyone who helped get them to Dallas!

As soon as the band got home back to Houston, the program had the incredible opportunity to have a residency with Playbook, a music software curriculum focused on providing resources for students to unlock their jazz potential in all aspects of the genre. The Playbook staff, consisting of members of *Sammy Miller and The Congregation*, came to Waltrip for three days to provide an in-person and interactive form of what Playbook is all about. The residency provided an opportunity for the Playbook staff to work with each of the four jazz bands at the band's own playing level. The program is so grateful



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for the opportunity to be the testing group for this innovative design of resources for young jazz musicians.

Adding to our Texas tour this year will be a stop in San Antonio for the Texas Music Educators Association (TMEA) Convention in February. The jazz band will be a demonstration group for a session led by **Jesse**

Espinosa, Director of Bands at Waltrip HS. The session will demonstrate how to warm up a jazz band as well as how to pick the best charts for your group.

Born out of the Jazz Ensemble is a cover band known as *The Big Horns*. They will be showcased at TMEA as well. This group consists of vocalists, a horn line and rhythm section, and they play music ranging from Stevie Wonder to Selena.

The students have had an incredible beginning of the year touring all over Texas and are so grateful for the endless opportunities to perform and work with so many incredible musicians from all over the world. They still

have more ahead of them as the program will be hosting its own jazz festival, the *Jazz@1900 Music Festival* in the spring. This year's featured guest will be trumpet artist, **Jon Faddis**. The festival will be at Waltrip High School on Saturday April 9, 2022, and will host bands of all levels from elementary jazz bands to advanced high school ensembles. The Lamar University Cardinal Jazz Orchestra, under the direction of **Rick Condit**, will be the featured guest band at the Alief Jazz Festival to be held on Saturday, March 5th at Kerr High School in Houston.

ALSO – the 2022 Lamar University Jimmy Simmons Jazz Festival will be held on Saturday, April 30th. Special guest artists for this non-competitive educational exchange will be **Kris Berg and the Metroplexity Big Band** with special guest, **Eric Marienthal**.

Kris Berg is a best-selling big band composer and arranger for over 20 years. Kris has written charts for artists such as Kurt Elling, John Pizzarelli, Wayne Bergeron, Chris Vadala, Delfeayo Marsalis, and Phil Woods, as well as for All-State jazz bands in Texas, Oklahoma, Montana, Arizona, and South

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Carolina, and for professional, college, and public school bands all over the world. His popular bass method book, *BASS LINES IN MINUTES*, has helped thousands of young bass players approach the art of the walking bass line.

Kris' latest release is his big band CD, *Time Management* (MAMA Records, MAA 1046), featuring the Metroplexity Big

Band with special guests Phil Woods, Wayne Bergeron, Clay Jenkins, Denis DiBlasio and Andy Timmons. "Time Management" is the follow up to his highly acclaimed 2012 release, *This Time / Last Year*. Both recordings feature Kris' unique writing and arranging as well as many of the outstanding musicians in the Dallas area and have garnered four Global Music Awards.

Eric Marienthal is a Grammy Award-nominated Los Angeles-based contemporary saxophonist best known for his work in the jazz, jazz fusion, smooth jazz, and pop genre

After graduating high school in Southern California in 1976, Eric went on to study at the Berklee College of Music in Boston, Mass. There he studied with the legendary saxophone professor, Joe Viola. By the time he left Berklee, Eric had achieved the highest proficiency rating given by the school. In 1995, Eric was awarded the Berklee Distinguished Alumnus Award for outstanding achievements in contemporary music. He has since gone on to perform in over 75 different countries, recorded 14 solo CD's and has played on hundreds of records, films, television shows, and commercial jingles.

Eric started his professional career in 1980 with famed New Orleans trumpeter Al Hirt. After returning to Los Angeles Eric became a member of the famed Chick Corea Elektric Band. He recorded six CD's with the band and won two Grammy Awards. Eric went on to join the Jeff Lorber Fusion. Among the CD's Eric recorded with Jeff, two were nominated for Grammy Awards. Jeff Lorber was instrumental is producing many of Eric's CD's. Other artists Eric has performed with include Elton John, Barbara Streisand, Billy Joel, Stevie Wonder, Dionne Warwick, Burt Bacharach, Aaron Neville, Johnny Mathis, Dave Grusin, Lee

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Ritenour, George Duke, David Benoit, The Rippingtons, The Gordon Goodwin Big Phat Band, Patti Austin, Lou Rawls, David Lee Roth, The Yellowjackets, B.B. King, Ramsey Louis, Patti Labelle, Olivia Newton-John, and many others. You can check out Eric's many fine performances on YouTube.

CALLING ALL COMPOSERS!

TJEA is soliciting jazz etudes for 2015-2016 All-State Jazz Ensemble audition packet. Etudes are needed for the following instruments:

Saxophone (Alto, Tenor, and Baritone will use the same etudes) Trumpet, Tenor Trombone, Bass Trombone, Guitar, Piano, Bass

Etudes are needed in the following styles: SWING – BALLAD – LATIN - FUNK

Etudes should be relatively brief. Past etudes have ranged in length from approximately 16 to 40 measures. Etudes should contain rhythmic, technical and range challenges (within reason) that allow judges to differentiate the playing ability of those auditioning.

Etudes should be based on traditional jazz chord progressions e.g. blues or standards. Include chord symbols with your etude. TJEA will make available mp3 files that will allow students to

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practice the etudes with accompaniment. These accompaniments will NOT be used in the actual auditions.

Include tempo/style markings, dynamics, and articulations with your etude. Etudes for tenor trombone and trumpet may be written in such a manner that the first two thirds of the etude will be of moderate difficulty and range with the last third reserved for more difficulty and higher range. This will allow a region to use the

material at local auditions for students who may not possess the skills for the State level, but may be interested in the Region level.

Etudes for guitar, piano and bass should include sections that are fully-notated as well as sections with just chord symbols.

Etudes should be notated with a computer notation program (preferably Finale or Sibelius), or can be neatly handwritten and scanned.
